A puzzle box without a picture. Working with theatre archives open session

We are comfortable discussing how to organize performing arts archives, both physical and virtual. But what about the sources gathered there? Written and spoken, photographic and phonographic, audiovisual and other? If we are aware that theatre happens only "here and now", and "there and then" exists only as an afterimage, can we properly use preserved documents, which most often resemble a puzzle box without a picture? The question we want to ask is not how to faithfully reconstruct a historical representation (this is a utopian concept), but how to avoid the temptation of over-interpretation when we try to imagine what is most probable.
